DEAR RESIDENT

WE REMAIN COMMITTED TO TRANSFORMING SHEERWATER

You will have seen or heard that the council is reviewing the Sheerwater Regeneration Project and I would like to explain why and what that means.

There has always been a plan to conduct a mid-project review, and with five phases underway or complete, now is the time to pause, reflect and consider what we might do differently to deliver the project's outcomes as efficiently and cost-effectively as possible.

Whilst the council's challenging financial situation is a key consideration, we remain committed to transforming Sheerwater and delivering much needed homes. This could for example, mean working with another developer, or a housing association, to deliver some of the remaining phases.

For now, work on the red, yellow and copper phases continues as planned (see page 3) but we won't start building any new phases until we have considered all of the options available to us.

Any significant departure from our agreed regeneration plans would require consent from the council's Planning Committee and be subject to rigorous scrutiny to ensure local needs are met.

We have set out to transform the centre of Sheerwater into an attractive, sustainable garden suburb and we remain committed to this vision and the promises made to you. You only need to look at the activity on pages 3 and 4 to see that the transformation of Sheerwater is still very much happening.

TRANSFORMING SHEERWATER

HOMES FOR NATURE

In time for spring, Gilbert-Ash has installed five bat boxes, three bird boxes, two bug hotels and a sparrow box within the red phase brickwork to support and encourage wildlife to thrive. Three swift nesting boxes have also been installed in the east elevation of Merchant House.

Over the coming weeks and months, we will keep you updated on the review and any opportunities we plan to explore. It is not a question of 'if' we will continue the regeneration, but 'how', and with your safety and wellbeing front of mind.

We know how challenging it is for residents living on site and the last few months have been particularly difficult for some. We're doing everything we can to minimise the disruption and respond quickly as issues arise, which they typically do during projects of this size.

I'm continually grateful for your patience, cooperation and understanding.

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NEWS IN BRIEF

GILBERT-ASH RAISES £3,500 TO SUPPORT SHEERWATER RESIDENTS

In the run up to Christmas, Gilbert-Ash and its subcontractors collected £3,500 across both its sites (red and yellow) which has been split equally between St Michael's, Mascot and ShopWise to support their activities.

FUNDING BID UNSUCCESSFUL

Last year the council submitted a bid to the government's Levelling Up Fund in the hope of securing £3.8 million to support the development of an innovative 'health and community campus' in Sheerwater.

In January 2023, the government awarded £2.1 billion to 111 projects throughout the UK. There were only 10 successful bids in the southeast, the nearest being £20m awarded for the development of a new leisure centre in Farnborough.

Louise Strongitharm, the council's Strategic Director for Communities, said: "The council is disappointed to have missed out on this latest round of Levelling Up government funding. Sheerwater is the second most deprived area in Surrey, particularly in relation to health outcomes, so we felt we had a strong case to benefit from this infrastructure support fund."

WINTER WATER LEAKS

In December, frozen pipes and thawing ice caused multiple water leaks in the apartments along Dartmouth Avenue. With support from the council's Asset Management team, the majority of retailers were able to continue trading but affected households were provided with temporary accommodation.

GAS LEAKS

Residents living in the flats in Loder Close and Forsyth Path were evacuated and provided with temporary accommodation following the theft of copper piping linked to the gas network.

DARTMOUTH AVENUE GARAGE BLOCK CLEARED OF FLY-TIPPING



Copper phase contractor, Lifebuild, has been granted a licence from the council to use the garage block at the eastern end of Dartmouth Avenue as an equipment store. The block, which had become a fly-tipping hotspot, has now been cleared and secured.

HOME VISITS

Welfare and property checks are being carried out on all council homes across the borough. At the end of January, a team of ten housing officers visited 42 council properties in Sheerwater to check for issues such as mould and damp. The loss of residual heat from neighbouring empty properties may start to affect your home. IMPROVING Conditions for Residents

Working with a specialist consultant, we have developed a health and safety action plan to mitigate risks and improve living conditions for residents in the regeneration area. The action plan will ensure pedestrian and vehicle routes are kept separate and free from obstructions; walkways are suitably lit; surfaces are maintained; walls and fences are fixed: vacant properties are secured; and pest control measures are put in place. Progress against the action plan will be monitored monthly by the council's project team.

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CANALSIDE DEVELOPMENT NEWS



It's now 18 months since the first tenants moved into Fairfax Place and Murray Place. A recent Thameswey tenant satisfaction survey has revealed that 83% of all Thameswey Housing tenants (borough-wide), are satisfied with their landlord. 80% of tenants are happy with the home they rent from Thameswey, and over three quarters said Thameswey staff are helpful, polite and treat residents with respect. Thameswey's repairs service was rated 'good' and 79% of tenants said they are satisfied with the cleaning of the internal communal areas.

Gilbert-Ash is making rapid progress on site. Foundation works are well underway, and the secondfloor columns and slabs have been constructed for the first of four medium rise apartment blocks. This is what you can see rising above the hoarding along Dartmouth Avenue.

Water and gas diversions have been completed and in the coming months the concrete frames of the other apartment blocks, and the podium garden that connects them, will start to take shape and become visible.



Internal fit out is progressing well across the site as is the landscaping of Central Square – the outdoor public space and play area opposite Fairfax and Murray Place. Included in the range of challenging multi-play equipment is a balance beam, hammock swing, rope bridge, two banister slides and several rope nets. The choice of colours and natural materials complement the decorative safety surface to form an attractive play area which will open in time for the arrival of the warmer weather. In the next couple of weeks, Gilbert-Ash will also begin landscaping the podium garden that connects New Woodlands (the sheltered apartment block) with Merchant House (the apartment block above the shops).



To reflect its location next to the Basingstoke Canal, Copper phase has been branded 'The Reeds'.



The first batch of completed homes have been handed over to Thameswey to begin marketing. Scan here to download The Reeds marketing brochure for a

Also available soon for affordable rent, are four twobedroom and four three-bedroom houses, each with rear gardens and allocated parking. - In May, you need photo ID to vote at a polling station. Accepted forms of ID include a passport, driver's licence, identity card, blue badge or bus pass.
- If you don't have photo ID, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate before 25 April 2023.
- You don't need photo ID to vote by post or proxy.
